



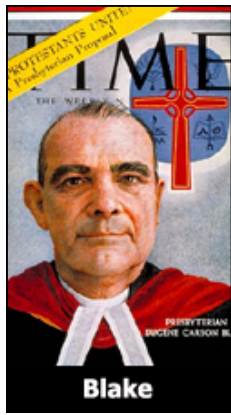

Presbyterians set a model for Christian unity

Since the first American Presbytery was organized in Philadelphia in 1706, Presbyterians have demonstrated an orderliness and organization that permits individual Christians and congregations to work together to spread the Good News wider and more efficiently.

That's pretty much the way it works in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA. Just as each of the Presbyterian Church's 10,000 congregations remains the basic unit of mission but works in cooperation with synods, Presbyteries and other denominations, each of the 35 member communions of the NCC retains its own polity, traditions and leadership styles as it works with others on common ministries for the good of all.

Presbyterian leaders played a major role in the formation and development of the NCC, foremost

among them the **Rev. Dr. Samuel McCrea Cavert**, the NCC's first general secretary, who presided over the massive job of organizing the new Council in 1951 and was instrumental in the development and publication of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. **The Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake**, another icon of ecumenism, is synonymous with all the causes in which Presbyterians were key leaders, including peace, justice and civil rights. Presbyterians like **the Rev. Patricia McClurg**, **Dr. William Thompson** and **the Rev. Syngman Rhee**, presided over the National Council of Churches with deftness and insight.

Each of these leaders and many more responded powerfully to the prayer of Jesus that we all be one, and helped Create the model of ecumenism that the NCC strives to be.

Who we are

The National Council of Churches was founded in 1950 by Protestant, Orthodox and African-American faith groups. It is the largest inter-denominational religious movement in North America. The NCC has headquarters in New York City and a Capitol Hill office in Washington. It is governed by an annual General Assembly, with delegates from member churches.

Programs

- Education and Church Leadership, with 15 areas of emphasis, by age and interest.
- Scripture translation. The NCC owns the copyright of the NRSV and RSV Bibles.
- Interfaith Relations.
- Environmental Concerns.
- Faith and Order
- Public Policy and Advocacy.
- Mobilization to reduce poverty.
- Research, including the Yearbook of American and Canadian Churches.
- Communication: advocacy for access to and integrity of media.

Leaders

The President of the NCC is **Archbishop Vicken Aykazian** of the Armenian Orthodox Church of America. The General Secretary is the **Rev. Dr. Michael Kinnamon** of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).



*Presbyterians have been essential members of the staff of the National Council of Churches, most notably **the Rev. Dr. Eileen W. Lindner** who served the Council in a variety of positions for over three decades.*
