Within hours of the September 11th terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center, the Long Island Council of Churches mobilized for disaster relief. We collected clothing, blankets, water, food, and gear for the rescue workers through our Riverhead office. We also collaborated with other agencies to gather information and get help to those affected by the disaster.

We were one of the few agencies on Long Island to provide direct assistance to those who lost their jobs due to the terrorist attacks but did not fit the eligibility criteria for FEMA and other social service agencies because they had not lost loved ones, nor were they located in Lower Manhattan.

With generous grants from several denominations we were able to assist 353 households with housing, utilities, fuel and gas, transportation, medical prescriptions and basic other living expenses. We also partnered with FECS, a Long Island Jewish Family and Health Services agency, to provide a complete array of job services for WTC clients from both agencies.
